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Letter from our executive director

Dear Friends & Supporters of WISE,

Another year has passed with some greater challenges and accomplishments. This past year has held much sorrow for so many people in our communities as well as globally. There has been an exponential increase in internally displaced people and refugees due to war, natural disasters and the economic impact of climate change. WISE has meet these challenges by partnering with some of its past international fellows to develop programming and training opportunities to address the needs of refugees and economic migrants. WISE' Parent Encouragement Specialist also developed workshops for parents/guardians and youth on trauma and its impact on parenting and youth development, coping strategies, and mental health and wellness. WISE offers it curricula and technical assistance free of charge and makes these curricula and workshops available through its online platforms and through its partnerships with other coalitions and programs associated with the U.S. Department of State.

Locally, WISE had some firsts this past year. A Youthled and Youth-designed Immigrant & Refugee Youth Summit was held last fall with 60 students in attendance. There were an additional 20 students who could not be accommodated due to the space capacity. This will be an annual event with the 2024 Youth Summit hosting between 120-150 youth. WISE staff presented at two different international conferences, one in Romania and the other in London, on working with immigrant and refugee girls/ female-identified students and their families. And WISE convened a group of Hmong domestic/sexual violence advocates to create a culturally-responsive framework for developing a new active bystander intervention model specific to the Hmong community for the prevention of gender-based violence.

In 2023 WISE added another school to its Girls Getting Ahead in Leadership (GGAL) and Healthy Relationship program sites, Hmong College Prep Academy (and in January 2024 added HOPE Community Academy serving high school students). Hmong College Prep Academy students are middleschoolers and receiving credit for the classes WISE provides.

WISE also had some staff and board changes as people moved onto their dream jobs or terms ended. WISE has been very fortunate to have excellent staff and board members who during their tenure help improve the infrastructure, service delivery, outreach and financial stability of the organization. Self-empowerment is part of WISE' name and as an agency all support the continued growth of staff and board members, even if it means moving on from WISE.

Fiscal year 2024 will see us moving into our goal for creating a capital campaign for a new facility, where WISE is able to provide services onsite and incorporate a social enterprise project that benefits the communities it serves. 2024 will also see an increase in staff positions and more international partnerships that support its two goals of ending child marriage and education for all girls. Please keep abreast of our progress toward our strategic plan goals by following us on our social media platforms, and explore volunteer and mentoring options the agency has to help support its middle and high school students.

Economic Sustainability

Cross-Cultural Communication

Self-Determination & Self-Actualization


It is the right of each woman and girl to have the freedom to develop her own identity, take pride in both her cultural heritage and personal accomplishments, and choose the best path for herself.






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Impact Overview



Where we come from

WISE values diversity, inclusion, and intentional cross-cultural communication in order to foster understanding and impact social change. In 2023, our team and program participants represented 23 different countries and 25 ethnic groups across the globe.





Looking Forward

The progress on our 2022-2027 Strategic Development Plan



New Facility

Staff began discussions on space needs and types of programmatic expansions to be accommodated in a new

facility; and identifying potential funding sources for a feasibility study.



Financial Resources

WISE was chosen to participate in a fundraising cohort sponsored by GiveMN to increase organizational capacity and infrastructure to increase the number and range of individual giving to the agency. Topics included donor stewardship, cultivating new donors, messaging and streamlining online giving, as well as other subjects.



Organizational Health & Wellness

Staff now has a benefits package that includes life, short- and long-term insurance. WISE received a Rest Up grant from the Women's Foundation of MN for self-care and purchased FitBits for all of its staff; and are planning more self-care activities for 2024.



Program Development

WISE has developed workshops for parents that focus on trauma,

understanding it and how it appears in their daily lives as parents and in their child's life; and coping strategies and community resources for reducing triggers and supporting mental health and wellness.



Technology

WISE developed accessibility guidelines for its social media,

digital presentations and digital content that is periodically reviewed to incorporate the newest technologies and recommendations.



Communications

WISE leveraged additional resources to contract with a social media specialist, and with a fundraising coach, to further the organization's communications and development plan. The communications and development plan is monitored by the Communications & Development Manager, WISE Marketing Development Committee and the Executive Director.



Evaluation

WISE refined evaluation tools to include Photo-Voice method, and began planning for focus groups with a professional evaluator for the GGAL and Healthy Relationships programs.



Staff Development

WISE held quarterly self-care staff retreats which were planned by teams

of two staff to pick the theme, and design and implement the activities.

Two staff took their two-week Sabbaticals in 2023 where they choose a project or training that supports their professional development, which may or may not correspond to their current position at WISE. This allows staff to branch out into other areas of nonprofit work that ultimately benefits the agency and the field.

All staff have workplans that include their professional and personal development goals that are reviewed on a monthly basis with the executive director to ensure that they have the support and training they need to meet their programmatic goals. Each workplan also includes one to three milestones from the long-range strategic plan that they have chosen to support the agency's work.

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Program Highlights

Empowering women and girls to reach their full potential

The Girls Getting Ahead in Leadership

(GGAL) and WeLEAD programs guide our participants in their educational, career, and life journeys as they begin to discover their identities, interests, and goals. This includes exposing participants to diverse learning opportunities and teaching them to navigate systems and resources.

INCREASING OUR PROGRAM REACH

Our GGAL program and Healthy Relationships program are now hosted at a new school site: Hmong College Prep Academy (HCPA). This brings our total youth program sites in 2023 to four.

HOSTING OUR FIRST YOUTH SUMMIT

WISE facilitated our first youth summit, led by six youth leaders from the GGAL program. The summit, called *Inspire, Unite, Thrive*, focused on bringing immigrant and refugee youth together to build awareness and foster friendship. A total of 60 youth from five schools and organizations participated.

SUPPORTING WOMEN IN THEIR PROFESSIONAL JOURNEYS

The WeLEAD program served 46 women in college and career navigation. Each woman received individualized support to guide them on their unique self-development journeys. The program saw students from 13 colleges in Minnesota enrolled in at least 11 disciplines.



Transforming communities to be safe and violence-free

Through the <u>Healthy Relationships and</u> <u>Sexual Violence Prevention (SVP) program</u>, WISE works with our youth and community partners to deliver violence prevention, intervention, and response strategies.

USING THE ARTS TO PROMOTE HEALTHY RELATIONSHIPS

Under the Healthy Relationships program, our youth wrote and filmed two music videos about self-love and navigating relationships.

CONCLUDING OUR FIRST SVP PROJECT

From 2020-2023, WISE partnered with Washington Technology Magnet School to address school-based dating violence, sexual assault, bullying, and stalking. The project wrapped up in September 2023 with over 500 students receiving genderbased violence education and active bystander intervention training.

BEING AN ACTIVE BYSTANDER

The SVP program facilitated two active bystander intervention trainings for the Karen community. Participants discussed how violence might look like in their respective culture and learned strategies to safely intervene when they spot signs of violence.



Supporting family health and wellbeing

The <u>Parent Encouragement</u> program provides trauma-informed and culturallyinformed education and resources for immigrant and refugee families. In 2023, a total of 11 families from Somali, Oromo, and Afghan backgrounds received services.

WORKING WITH NEWLY-ARRIVED AFGHAN FAMILIES

In partnership with <u>Lutheran Social</u> <u>Services</u>, the Parent program facilitated workshops for Afghan families on acculturation, generational gap, trauma, and family systems.

Mentorship

Mentors provide 1-1 support to youth participants and support the youth program coordinator in facilitating lessons and activities.

In 2023, 16 mentors from five colleges/universities in the Twin Cities volunteered in our youth programs.




